

Option B Total Opt Out of IOH Length and Weight limits

Effect of this Option B: Adoption of this ordinance pursuant to Sec. 348.27 (19)(b)5.a. of Wis. Statutes (as provided by 2013 Wis. Act 377) means that the governing body of a municipality or county authorizes operation, on all highways under their jurisdiction, implements of husbandry as defined in Sec. 340.01 (24) (see Act 377) and agricultural commercial vehicles as defined in Sec. 340.01 (1o) (see Act 377) to operate in excess of any length and weight limitations imposed by Chapter 348 of Wis. Statutes. However, all implements of husbandry and agricultural commercial vehicles are still bound to follow seasonal and special postings and any postings on highway bridges or culverts under Sec. 349.16 of Wis. Statutes.

Ordinance to Totally Opt Out of IOH Length and Weight Limits

Ordinance # 2015-03

Whereas, 2013 Wis. Act 377 under Sec. 348.27 (19)(b)5.a. provides that a municipality or county may authorize implements of husbandry as defined in Sec. 340.01 (24) and agricultural commercial vehicles as defined in Sec. 340.01 (1o) of Wis. Statutes to exceed any statutory length and weight limits imposed by Chapter 348 of Wis. Statutes,

Now, therefore, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the Town/Village Board of Washington, of Door County, that pursuant to Sec. 348.27 (19)(b)5.a. of Wis. Statutes, implements of husbandry and agricultural commercial vehicles as defined by Chapter 340 of Wis. Statutes may exceed any length and weight limits imposed by Chapter 348 of Wis. Statutes.

Further, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED that this ordinance shall be in effect for the calendar year of 2016.

{Option for length of time of effect... Further, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED that this ordinance shall remain in effect until rescinded by further action of the board.}

Further, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED that a copy of this ordinance shall be provided to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to be posted on the state DOT website.

Dear Landowner:

The purpose of this letter is to invite you participate in, and inform you of, the invasive species control project for the invasive *Phragmites australis*. This effort will focus on select shorelines that were previously treated through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) project grant. This WDNR control project is funded by Ducks Unlimited and managed by the Door County Soil & Water Conservation Department (SWCD).

The invasive, non-native, *Phragmites australis* can grow over 16 feet tall and can expand horizontally over 50 feet each year through stolon's or runners. This extremely aggressive plant displaces native plants, takes over wetland and riparian habitats, and reduces wildlife use. It can also decrease recreational opportunities, property values and block views of the water.

Phragmites will be treated below the ordinary high water mark by certified aquatic applicators carrying backpack sprayers. All necessary permits will be obtained by the certified applicator/contractor.

The next steps in this effort includes the signing and return of the enclosed permission form for treatment of *Phragmites* on or in front of your property and hopefully a voluntary donation to help treat all existing populations of *Phragmites*. The spraying will likely begin around September 8th and be completed around mid to late October 2015.

This is the only year of proposed treatment due to limited funding. After 2015, future grant funded assistance is uncertain and thus it will be critical that you, the landowner, stay vigilant and prevent any new populations from getting a foothold again.

It is important to note, that nearly all shoreline owners are susceptible to *Phragmites* colonizing their shoreline and that a unified effort is needed for successful control of *Phragmites*. We would like to personally thank you in advance for your support of this, and all SWCD, invasive species control efforts

- You will learn how interacting on a regular basis in this kind of outreach program *reduces the potential for crisis and/or injury* of the officer, consumer or others.

This training experience will be very challenging, not unlike these types of calls for service. Your effort will not be without rewards; the skills taught in this course will be used throughout your life both personally and professionally.




